#### Burrawan Book, Launched

Our latest publication Burrawan - The desecration and resurrection of Lake Innes, was launched on Friday 12 January, at the Innes Ruins, beside Lake Burrawan. The launch was attended by around 70 people, including Birpai elders and community members, the authors' extended family members and friends, community members from various organisations, staff from National Parks and Wildlife Service and members of the public.

The launch included: a Smoking Ceremony by Dr. Paul Collis, a Call to Our Old People by John Heath, a Welcome Dance led by Emily Heath together with mixed mob members, and addresses by the authors, John Heath and Ashley Barnwell; Dr. John Drinan, Agricultural Scientist and Environmentalist; and Kate Ashton from Revive Lake Cathie group. President Clive Smith was MC.

Congratulations to Ashley and John for researching and writing this much needed publication, highlighting important, little known, and forgotten aspects of our local environmental history and Birpai culture and traditions, together with truth telling.

A big thank you to Jesse James from National Parks and Wildlife Service, who together with other NPWS staff provided enormous support to stage the launch out at the Innes Ruins. Thanks also to the University of Melbourne who sponsored the launch, including the equipment hire. Finally, a very big thank you to Anne Oud, who liaised with National Parks, Port Hire, the authors, and everyone else involved to make the event a successful and enjoyable one for all involved. Thanks Anne!

Burrawan - The descration and resurrection of Lake Innes has been supported by the Create NSW Cultural Grants Program, a devolved funding program administered by the Royal Australian Historical Society on behalf of the NSW Government.


