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President's Report

When we were unsuccessful in obtaining a large grant to undertake the very detailed planning and design work that we had hoped would be the next step in our long-term transformation project, we realised we basically had to start again. In the meantime, having an engineer's report on our heritage building prompted us to seek to develop an over-arching strategy for managing the future of the heritage building that would also inform our future plans for the whole site (see the article to the right).

While the possibility of a major transformation project seemed real, we put off any major maintenance work on the post-1960 buildings (why spend money on something that we intend to demolish?). However, now that the transformation is deferred indefinitely, we have turned our attention to maintenance issues with the post-1960 buildings, as we need to keep our collections safe and secure, and have a safe and secure environment for our volunteers and visitors.

A preliminary list of works that need to be addressed has been drawn up, and will be discussed this month by the Facilities Planning & Management Sub-Committee, which will make recommendations to the Management Committee. Much of the work that needs to be done can only be done by professional tradespeople, and so will incur expenditure, some of it significant.

Our funds are somewhat limited, so the first task of he Management Committee will be to determine priorities. Some works will also involve closure of parts of the Museum from time to time, which would probably affect our income stream. Of course, where possible, grant funding will be sought, but our experience is that, for this sort of work (resulting largely from normal wear and tear), grant funding is quite scarce. We'll keep you informed.

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Conservation Management Strategy

We have recently secured funding to complete a Conservation Management Strategy for our State significant Store building. We will also be contributing our own funds to this very important project.

The project will include developing a Conservation Management Strategy that considers maintenance issues, access, flood and functionality analysis and opportunities for change. It will also establish a Works strategy for the Store building - establishing priorities, exploring options for access, connections and future development integration, developing costings and preparing concept drawings for discussion.

Until this happens and remediation works are identified and carried out (and funded), the upper level of the Store building will remain closed to the public. Making the upper level safe again is going to be a long term proposition. The timing for this project is still being worked through with the project consultants.


After reading the article and searching for 'Nellies' in our recently digitised collections, we came up with the following two objects.

One is a birthday postcard featuring a hand coloured photograph of a single red rose with printed verse and inscribed on the reverse 'To Dear Dot, wishing you a very Happy Birthday from Nellie/ also a Merry Xmas & a Happy New Year, lots of love Nellie'. The card was sent to Dorothy Mae Hyde, nee Herring 1923-2011 in 1943 on her 21st birthday. Who Nellie is remains a mystery. 

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Digitisation Hub Milestone

The Mid North Coast Regional Digitisation Hub has at last reached its major milestone of 1,000 items digitised and publicly accessible on eHive.

This means we can now acquit the Creative Capital Minor Works establishment grant and roll the task of collection digitisation into routine collection management activities at Port Macquarie Museum. We will also continue to support our 6 partner museums with the ongoing process of cataloguing and digitising their collections, and over time extend support and access to the Digitisation Hub and loan equipment to other museums and collecting organisations across the Mid North Coast. This has been a very large project for us and the largest grant we have received in our organisation's history. There have been many people working with us on this project at the partner museums.

We acknowledge the amazing support we received from consultant Andrew Long, who set up the equipment, digitisation and training processes. He delivered most of the training and even made our Hub window shades! We also acknowledge the support of consultant Liam Worth who came into the project towards the end to provide further photography support and training.

Thanks too to Lynda Warlters (digitisation processing) and Sue Trotter (cataloguing) who have supported Debbie Sommers over the past several months. The 1,000 items were contributed as follows: Bellingen - 67, Camden Haven - 41, Dorrigo - 32, Great Lakes — 53, Kempsey - 37, Port Macquarie - 662 and Wingham - 108.


